

What we found

Report summary

Whether it's bringing joy to the day-to-day or improving our self esteem, pets have a big impact on our lives. For many of us, they are an unparalleled source of support, with 53% of pet owners believing their pet understands them better than other people.

This is reflected in our relationships with pets; we treat our pets as part of the family and take a lot of pride in them — with nearly half of cat (46%) and dog (50%) owners saying that their pets are cuter than most babies.

They also impact our relationships with other people, from helping us forge new connections to strengthening ties with friends and family. 71% of pet owners say owning a pet has had a positive impact on their relationships with others. But our love of pets can also cause tensions — over half (56%) of pet owners believe if a partner didn't get along with their pet, it would be a problem.

And because they impact our well-being so profoundly, we'll go above and beyond to give them the best lives we can — 71% of pet owners say they would do anything to keep their pet happy. While 80% of owners attend to their pet's needs before their own as soon as they get home. 74% share their sofa or bed with their pets even if it makes them feel more uncomfortable, and 45% have cancelled social plans to spend time with their pets.

This dedication to the well-being of pets is even withstanding financial challenges during the cost of living crisis. Just take the two in five (38%) pet owners who say they're more likely to cut down on things for themselves to ensure their pet has the same quality of life.

Despite these challenges, 71% of pet owners feel happier because of their pets – showing pets ultimately transform our lives for the better.



Pets make our lives better

1.1 Feeling good

We believe pets make every day better

The top reason for getting a pet is the positive energy we believe they bring to our homes, and 85% of pet owners agree. Their tails wagging as we walk through the door, or a meow to say hello instantly brightens our day.

And on not-so-bright days, we love to cuddle pets because they bring us so much comfort, with 72% of pet owners citing this as a reason they got a pet. Academic research suggests this is driven by the sense of secure attachment that our pets provide us, which boosts our mental health.

1.2 Our best selves

Pets help us live our best lives

Pets impact how we feel about ourselves — many of us believe our pets makes us a better person. While over half (52%) of pet owners say they have become more compassionate since getting a pet, 46% say they've become more fun and 40% say they've become more confident.

Pets also help us build our interpersonal skills — two in five (39%) pet owners say their pets have helped them become more sociable. Beyond this, they also help enhance our approach to self-expression. Indeed, 32% of pet owners say they have become more creative since getting a pet, while 35% say they've become more interesting.

1.3 Unique bonds

We believe our pets can support us in ways no one else can

Pets offer us unique support, providing the emotional support we often can't get from other humans — even our friends and family. Over half of pet owners (53%) believe their pet understands them better than other people, while 65% say their pet can read their emotions. In academic literature, this connection has been coined as 'the pet effect', where companion animals become a key source of positive feelings for their owners.



2.1 Shifting family structures


Pets are part of the family – we see them as our own children

For many of us, pets are more than just companions — they're part of the family. As people increasingly put off or choose <u>not</u> to have children, pets are fulfilling a desire for something to care for. While 41% of pet owners with no children at home say they got a pet because they prefer them to having children, 33% say they did so because they wanted to expand their family but weren't ready for children. In fact, over 2 in 5 of dog owners (48%) and cat owners (46%) without children see their pets as a child.

This matches with our beliefs about our pets' perceptions of us. Indeed, many of us believe our pets see us as a parent, with over a third of cat owners (37%) and dog owners (33%) who don't have children saying so.

Incorporating pets into our families can have many benefits. <u>Academic research</u> even suggests that the well-being benefits pets can bring to pet owners are enhanced if they view and treat them as family members.

Pets at Home understands this special bond and develops pet products inspired by trends in baby, nursery and kids' fashion. These adhere to the highest quality standards, giving pet parents extra reassurance that their new arrival will be happy, healthy and safe.

2.2 Proud pet parents

We believe our pets are the best and like to show off their looks and personalities

From their appearance to their nature, we take a lot of pride in our pets. This is seen in TikTok hashtags like 'proudpetparents', with over 800 thousand views of pets doing tricks, sharing a sofa with their owners or simply posing for the camera.

The Pets at Home VIP club runs monthly competitions inviting customers to share photos and insights into their love for their pets. These regularly get up to 30,000 contributions.

Followers of Pets at Home on social media channels also love to share photos of their pets, with many referring to their pets as their 'fur baby' — a term that now has a place in the Oxford Dictionary.

We are proud pet parents in every sense; over half (51%) of pet owners are convinced that their pets are better behaved other people's. And the top three pet attributes that pet owners are proud of are their personality, their friendliness and how affectionate they are.

In tune with people's perceptions of their pets as their children, half of dog owners (50%) and nearly half of cat owners (46%) also believe that their pets are cuter than most babies.

2.3 Constant companions

We want our pets involved in all aspects of our lives - from the everyday to moments of celebration

Pets are ingrained into our lives. We love the companionship they provide — 37% of pet owners who work remotely at least some of the time say their pet keeps them company during their office hours. And they tag along on days out too — whether it's a visit to the local pub or a holiday away from home. In fact, 31% of dog owners take their pets to the pub.


But it's not just the everyday moments we want our pets involved in, they're included in seasonal festivities too — take the 88% of pet owners who say they celebrate Christmas with their pets. And pets are also getting involved in traditions around these celebrations, with over half (55%) of pet owners buying their pets presents at Christmas, including 62% of owners of small furry animals saying the same.

Pets at Home sales data also shows evidence of this growing desire to involve our pets in the festive period. Sales of Christmas jumpers and toys all significantly increased last year, and their dog advent calendar was the best seller in Christmas 2022.

Every year, due to the rising consumer demand, Pets at Home have increased the size and variety of their range. They've also seen an uplift in owners bringing their dogs in for a Christmas groom — over 20,000 dogs were booked in to Pets Grooming salons for a Christmas spa treatment.



We will go above and beyond to demonstrate our affection


With 71% of pet owners saying they would do anything to keep their pet happy, it's clear we are willing to invest time, money and effort into showing our love. For some, this takes the form of culinary treats, with over half (59%) of pet owners spending time in the kitchen to cook for their pets from scratch. When asked why, 54% of pet owners say it is simply because their pets are worth it.




seen an uplift across the range. From birthday hats to 'pawsecco', we are more keen than ever to party with our beloved pets.

And because Pets at Home know just how important it is to celebrate key milestones, their VIP club gives members a free gift every year on their pet's birthday.



We want to show how much we love our pets to others, and social media is a great place to start. Almost 1 in 4 (24%) of pet owners have a dedicated social media account for their pet.

We're also actively posting about our pets on our personal accounts, with 52% of pet owners posting about their pets at least every two days. Their motivations lie in wanting to celebrate them; while 41% of pet owners post to show their love for their pets, 32% do so to show off how great their pets are.

Pet owners invest a lot of time documenting their pets, 23% take photos of their pet every day and 27% do so every couple of days.

Those who take photos of their pets at least once a week spend an average of 2 hours doing so.

But some of us are looking for more permanent ways to display our affections. While one in five (19%) of pet owners say they have a tattoo of their pet, and a further 34% would consider getting one. When looking at particular groups, a quarter (25%) of pet owners with a rabbit have a tattoo of one of their pets, as have 21% of those with a dog and 20% with a cat.

Pets make (or break) our relationships

3.1 New connections

Pets have a huge impact on our social lives, helping us make new lasting relationships

Whether its small talk with strangers, making new friends on walks or attending dog meet ups, pets act as a major social lubricant, helping us form and maintain new bonds both online and in real life. In fact, 71% of pet owners say owning a pet has had a positive impact on their relationships with others, while 16% say their pets have helped them to make new friends.

A shared love for pets forms a strong basis for these relationships, helping us meet and build connections with fellow animal lovers. And with 24% of pet owners saying they chose to get a pet to increase their chances of making new friends (rising to 33% among 18-24-year-olds and 31% among men) it's clear people are aware of the positive social impacts pets can have on their lives.

3.2 Love triangles

Pets play a huge role in our romantic relationships and can make or break them

Pets have a significant impact on our love lives. They help us get ahead in the romance roulette, with one in five of pet owners (19%) agreeing that they chose to get a pet to increase their chances of finding a partner, rising to 31% for pet owners in Greater London. On dates, they're the perfect ice breakers — 12% of pet owners say they find it much easier to talk to potential love interests because of their pet.


On the flip side, pets can also be a source of tension in romantic relationships. In fact, over half (56%) of pet owners believe that if a partner didn't get along with their pet, it would be a problem for them. At the same time, pets can stall potential breakups — 31% of people would stay with a partner longer if they liked their pet. But it's also a source of worry — 54% of pet owners agree that having a shared pet with a partner can make the breakup harder and 36% say that thinking about who would get the pet if they broke up worries them a lot.

That said, pets can also be a source of support during heartbreak — over half (56%) of pet owners say that getting a pet can help people get over a breakup.

As pets increasingly become part of our love lives, compatibility with our pets is becoming a deal breaker in the quest for a potential partner. With this in mind, Tinder launched a pop-up pub experience called The Bark & Spark, where singles could bring their dogs on a first date. Set in locations across London. Edinburgh and Manchester, the event provided people with a low-pressure way to make real-world connections with fellow animal lovers.

"With my wife, I can talk about fish and what plants we are going to get for the tank. I just sit there with my wife and look at them. We definitely spend more quality time together after having the tank."

4.1 Pet worries

We worry about our pets' emotional and physical welfare

The love we feel for our animal companions means that we also fret over them -85% of pet owners say they worry about their pets.

Busy lifestyles and routines only exacerbate these worries. Indeed, 27% of pet owners worry about leaving their pets alone for long periods of time — rising to 32% among those who only own dogs.


But these aren't the only concerns pet owners face. The cost of living crisis has put many pockets in a pinch — luckily Pets at Home have a wealth of money saving advice, ranging across subjects such as pet nutrition, emergency care, and insurance.

Concerns around the mental health of pets is rising, with insurance companies reporting an increasing demand for claims covering treatments that address the mental well-being of our furry friends.

One in ten (11%) pet owners say they're worried about their pet's behaviour. Some events are particularly concerning to them; for example, 29% of pet owners say that fireworks night/any events with fireworks is a very stressful period.

Anxiety around fireworks can be traumatic for pets and their families. But there are things that can done to help. We would strongly advise speaking to one of our Veterinary professionals to gain long term help and support pets through their anxiety."

4.2 Seeking support

We seek support on how to best care for our pets

Because we love our pets we want to equip ourselves with the knowledge on how to best care for them. To do this, we predominantly turn to professional sources for support and advice on our pets needs. Over a third (36%) of pet owners say they turn to their vets for advice on taking care of their pets. This increases to 56% for those who are retired and to 43% for people without children.

Pet owners are also willing to consult more informal sources for guidance, with 32% saying they put their trust in online resources — increasing to 45% among owners of small furry animals. Many people are also turning to vets and 'petfluencers' on platforms like TikTok, who have hundreds of thousands of followers on their accounts.

Vets for Pets has a network of almost 500 practices and surgeries who are on hand to support pet owners when they need it. 
We will ensure our pets' needs are met, despite financial pressures
